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TAKING ADVANTAGE OF THE OTHER PARTY'S EXPERTS: CROSS-EXAMINATION TIPS

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GET THE EXPERT'S FILE

- Vancouver Community College v. Phillips Barratt et al, (1987), 20 B.C.L.R. (2d) 289
- Earlier the better
- Entire file including letter of instruction, drafts, emails etc.

ATTACK THE CREDENTIALS

- Typically not the basic qualifications
- Scrutinize the C.V.
- Know the expert's actual practice

USE THE INTERNET

- Generally
- Case authorities

DIVIDE AND CONQUER

Generate disagreement from the expert with respect to assertions advanced by another of the same party's experts.

UNDERMINE FACTUAL ASSUMPTIONS

- Be intimately familiar with the clinical records/raw data
- Look for what is missing, inadvertently or purposefully
- Expose reliance on other expert's opinions
- Where possible, put facts to the expert elicited in evidence which are inconsistent with the expert's theory/opinion

EXPLOIT BIAS

- Whose side?
- Offering opinions in areas outside of expertise
- Offering opinions on credibility

KNOW THE SCIENCE

- Expert's may "fudge" the science
- Do a literature search
- Use your own expert to educate you
